SUNDAY, JUNE 4, 2023 ■ PENTECOST

The reading is from Acts of the Apostles 2:1-II When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly a sound came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them tongues as of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. Now there were dwelling in Jerusalem Jews, devout men from every nation under heaven. And at this sound the multitude came together, and they were bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in his own language. And they were amazed and wondered, saying, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us in his own native language? Parthians and Medes and Elamites and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontos and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabians, we hear them telling in our own tongues the mighty works of God."

The Gospel According to John 7:37-52; 8:12 On the last day of the feast, the great day, Jesus stood up and proclaimed, "If any one thirst, let him come to me and drink. He who believes in me, as the scripture has said, 'Out of his heart shall flow rivers of living water." Now this he said about the Spirit, which those who believed in him were to receive; for as yet the Spirit had not been given, because Jesus was not yet glorified.

When they heard these words, some of the people said, "This is really the prophet." Others said, "This is the Christ." But some said, "Is the Christ to come from Galilee? Has not the scripture said that the Christ is descended from David, and comes from Bethlehem, the village where David was?" So there was a division among the people over him. Some of them wanted to arrest him, but no one laid hands on him.

The officers then went back to the chief priests and Pharisees, who said to them, "Why did you not bring him?" The officers answered, "No man ever spoke like this man!" The Pharisees answered them, "Are you led astray, you also? Have any of the authorities or of the Pharisees believed in him? But this crowd, who do not know the law, are accursed." Nikodemos, who had gone to him before, and who was one of them, said to them, "Does our law judge a man without first giving him a hearing and learning what he does?" They replied, "Are you from Galilee too? Search and you will see that no prophet is to rise from Galilee." Again Jesus spoke to them, saying, "I am the light of the world; he who follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

Message from Holy Cross Landscape Reautification Committee

Things are buzzing at Holy Cross -- - with the Festival in front of us, and other big projects planned by the Building Committee upcoming... and your Landscape / Beautification Committee is also very busy. We have met with our Landscape Architect (Laquatra) to start our next phase which really includes 3 areas of our Entryway and upper driveway (The 'Garden of Love', The 'Cross Garden', and the bank/hillside below our drop-off and front entry.) Our budget has been revised to \$200,000 from the Master Plan costs of over \$280,000.

Our fundraising started robustly with 'Matching Donations' (money intended to kick-start the project and incentivize donations from our parishioners and community) with \$102,000 being pledged. To date, \$26,580 has been donated and received from our community (to be matched by the initial 20 family's' pledges).

We prayerfully and respectfully ask for more of you to contribute, so we can hopefully commence this phase in Fall of this year.

This phase of our work will make a tremendous difference to the aesthetical, and practical usage and overall appeal of our main entry, which everyone, parishioner and visitor alike, sees as they enter our Church!
